

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

BOPIS- OMNICHANNEL RETAILERS TAKE NOTE

I am not talking about Bopis the traditional Filipino dish which usually consists of pork's heart and lungs that are stewed alongside garlic, onions, and a variety of vegetables and spices. I am referring to Buy Online Pick up In-Store (BOPIS, as most retailers have now coined the term). It is not new however this behaviour is taking over the consumer in Malaysia and it is growing more popular with shoppers, and that trend is expected to continue.

This trend is popular in the US as nearly 70% of the shoppers have used BOPIS

more than once, according to Business Insider Intelligence. While recent trends in consumer demand seem to indicate that online shopping is preferred among many consumers, brick-and-mortar stores are not quite redundant. Clearly, there is a mixture of preferences among consumers, with some preferring online shopping against visiting physical stores. Considering this, the BOPIS offers a great balance between both – and shoppers can use it as it suits their lifestyles, schedules and needs.



More Shoppers Use BOPIS

So what was important to the consumers regarding the BOPIS? Half say they've made purchases online based on whether BOPIS was available. By choosing this option they are saving on shipping costs and have the added benefit of not needing to spend time browsing in-store. This reduces the likelihood of making impulse purchases. We can see this trend in our local scene like the fast food chain.

Speed and convenience are the prime motivations behind selecting BOPIS. Consumers

want a quick in-and-out shopping experience saying they would prefer to collect items from a designated area close to the store front. In fact, 80% of consumers expect to spend a maximum of 10 minutes in-store collecting their items, while 27% say they would prefer a maximum of 4 minutes.

These consumer opinions create a fantastic opportunity for capturing business if the retailers can be met head-on.

So what are the preparations and plans for a retailer to implement for the BOPIS wave?

Why Retailer Should Change?

Because BOPIS is popular with customers and can generate additional in-store revenue, 90% of brick-and-mortar retailers will offer BOPIS by 2021. It presents an opportunity to build customer loyalty and generate more online and in-store revenue when retailers do it well.

So what are the preparations and plans for a retailer to implement for the BOPIS wave? To meet rising customer expectations, BOPIS must deliver several things that is all supported by customer,

inventory and payment data. Now, more shoppers are satisfied with mobile than with the desktop, which means any retailer who wants to win at BOPIS needs to provide a robust mobile experience as well as a good desktop experience. Ease of finding items in the online store is vital. A low-friction checkout process is another essential part of the BOPIS experience, especially on mobile devices. The fewer steps customers must take to pay for their purchases, the more likely they are to complete their orders.

Other factors are customers are more likely to use the store's BOPIS service showing available items in real-time with inventory visibility, good communication among stores and regional distribution centres and manage inventory availability.

The final process is having a satisfying pickup process that

starts before the customer arrives and for send reminders on time and where the pickup counter is. Giving information on any special parking for the shoppers would be an added advantage. This is one area where even the retailers with the highest BOPIS customer ratings fell short, creating some confusion for shoppers when they arrived at the store.

Another point to note is to ensure shoppers expect not to have to wait in line and to have their orders to be ready... fast—ideally within an hour. The retailer must be able to screen and verify orders quickly to deliver on pickup time expectations. Store staff must be able to find ordered items fast, bring them to the pickup counter and let customers know their order is ready.

Another element of a good in-store pickup is identifying

customers correctly without making them go through multiple steps to prove their identity. The quality of the experience at the counter will depend on accurate data to verify customer identity.

The flip side, of course, is that a BOPIS experience that's fragmented or impersonal risks driving customers away—especially if nearby competitors offer a better experience.

However, when it is done correctly, you will be surprised that BOPIS will have more benefits than you can think of. Having customers come in store to pick up purchases provides another opportunity for sales, and research suggests that more often than not customers coming in for pick-ups will also make additional purchases while in store.

So are you prepared for the next wave?





RISE OF SMART CITY IN MALAYSIA

To cope with the increasing population, hyper-urbanisation, globalisation as well as to ensure economic and environmental stability, cities are now focusing on becoming smart cities. Smart City is a concept of utilising technologies and connected data sensors to enhance and become powerful in terms of infrastructure and city operations. Therefore, smart cities will be key to supporting tomorrow's businesses, and more part of the DNA. Malaysia, for one, has recently revealed the groundwork for its next smart city project in Johor, Sabah & Sarawak.

Smart Cities is a next generation approach to urban management with solutions that address these issues and improve the quality of life of urban dwellers.



friendly communities for the usage of this infrastructure intelligently to improve the quality of life of those who live and visit there.

In conclusion, smart cities can extensively stimulate Malaysia's economic growth and provide the necessary infrastructural support for the deployment of advanced, intelligent and connected digital solutions.

Using technology with the aim of improving people's living conditions and improving urban sustainability, is truly the definition of "smart."





TERENGGANU - THE TRULY ISLAMIC DESTINATION

Terengganu is situated in eastern Peninsular Malaysia and after a checked from Wikipedia, it was the first Malay state to receive Islam, as attested to a Stone with Arabic inscriptions found in Kuala Berang, the capital of the district of Hulu Terengganu. The inscribed date which is incomplete due to damage can be read as various dates from 1303 to 1387 CE (common era).

So if you are making a trip there, other then the beaches, visiting the mosque in Terengganu will make your holidays unforgettable. Before you visit the mosque, I recommend you to learn some of the basic visiting etiquettes to make your visit a pleasant and worthwhile experience.


Crystal Mosque Pulau Wan Man, Kuala Terengganu

You do not want to miss the most unique mosque that is made it one of the most popular tourist attractions in Malaysia. Located in the Islamic Heritage Park sitting on a man-made Island off Terengganu which took two years to be built. Opened to the public on 8th February 2008 when it was completed the same year.

The exterior of the mosque is coated with steel, glass and crystal which are the three main materials in the construction of this magnificent piece of architecture which gave it its name. The illumination from inside, makes it look like the glass domes are shining. This Mosque accommodates up to 1,500 worshippers at a given time and also made its name internationally for its beauty. The Crystal Mosque is not only breathtaking but innovative as

the first 'smart mosque' using solar to light up the mosque and equipped with Wi-Fi and IT facilities.

During your visit, do not be surprised if you see a photo shoot going on, especially wedding photo shoots. This place has become one of the top photo shoot venues that there is hardly a day without a couple posing for their reunion keepsakes.



Masjid Ulul Albab, Kampung Kayu Seberang, Jerteh

If you are travelling through the road linking Kota Baru and Kuala Terengganu, you will not miss the distinctive palace looking, the oldest surviving mosque in the country. The mosque is constructed without nails or bolts crafted joined using the traditional techniques of pegs and joints with nearly 100% local hardwoods, Chengal (supported by concrete beams). Originally built with cement and concrete but was demolished later and rebuilt to accommodate the growing worshippers. Even now the minaret is built using the hardwood.

Surrounding the mosque is a well groomed garden. Built on stilts with the purpose of protecting it from flood and animals, it also gives that extra space below for activities. Inspired using the motif of Terengganu "Songket" a type of embroidered cloth with gold or silver thread on all

the walls and gates to reflect a Terengganu indeed. This mosque can accommodate 1,500 worshippers at any one time.

Masjid Ulul Albab is definitely a community hub for the people here and it is packed all year round.



Masjid Sultan Zainal Abidin (White Mosque), Kuala Terengganu

Constructed in the late 18th century near the city centre, the mosque has been renovated over the years, with the current structure drawing from Mughal and colonial architecture. The mosque is painted with white, is also known as the White Mosque or the Big Mosque, is

located in Kuala Terengganu. Decorated with several calligraphic carvings of verses from the Quran, prayers and arabesques were carved on the mosque's entrance doors and grills. It underwent another restoration with addition minarets and pillars, which now can accommodate 2,500 worshippers within a single session for mass prayers.



Masjid Tengku Zaharah (Floating Mosque), Teluk Ibai

Named after the mother of the late Terengganu sultan, it is the first real floating mosque in Malaysia, constructed on a floating platform in a lagoon. The mosque is situated in Kuala Ibai, four kilometres away from the town centre of Kuala Terengganu. The design is inspired by traditional Malay and Moorish architecture, built with marble, ceramics, mosaic

works and bomanite paving. The white facet stands out with a balance of boldness and simplicity. The white structure of the mosque covers an area of roughly 5 acres and can accommodate up to 2000 attendees at a time.

As the mosque is surrounded by a lake, it will look enchantingly inspirational with the reflection from the lake and much like a place in the tale of 1,001 Arabian Nights.





BEST BURN CALORIES


WITH THIS PARTY DANCE WORKOUT

Planks and crunches are great, but if you start doing them all the time, being stuck on the floor can get a bit boring. Dance workouts are more enjoyable and can fire up the same muscles, especially if you do it in a group, it's more fun and you will be easily motivated.

Dancing is a great way to get your heart rate up, get rid of extra body fat, and build lean muscle. This form of a workout uses a wide variety of motions to engage multiple muscle groups in a dynamic way that uses a significant amount of calories. The exact number burned depends largely on what style you're doing. There are so many different kinds of dance that you can do it a group just like you are having a dance party, like Zumba, Line Dance, Aerobics, Hip-Hop, and Belly Dance.



DANCING CALORIES BURNED PER HOUR



Zumba

Zumba has gained a cult like followings because it's fun, and its exercise. It can be hard to find those two things together. Women in an average weight range, say roughly 54-77kg, are going to burn between **350 and 650 calories** in an hour of Zumba.

Line-Dancing

Dances like the Cha Cha, Slide and Cupid Shuffle that everyone dances alone, side by side, facing the same direction in lines or rows. This is popular among the senior "aunties" and is definitely a moderate way to burn calories. An hour of dancing burns about **300 calories** based on roughly 68 kg.



Aerobics

Aerobics is a form of physical exercise that combines rhythmic exercise with stretching and strength training routines. For a low impact workout a total of **295 calories and 413 calories**

for step aerobics based on 58kg. For those hard core you may want to do the step aerobics that increases your calorie expenditure to **502 calories**, which will help you to shade some weight.





Hip Hop

Hip hop involves large movements of the entire body, which places it high on the expenditure scale. It also often involves freestyle, meaning that muscle groups are kept guessing and are less likely to stop responding to the exercise or hit a plateau. In 60 minutes, hip hop will use between **370** (for people of lighter bodyweights) to **610** (for those weighing 80kg and up) calories.



Belly Dancing

Get your abs working and exercise, an expressionist type of dance that emphasizes complex movements of the torso. Any of the routine from percussive movement to shivers and vibrations movements, an estimation of **270-320** for less intense versions, and between **290**

and **360** for faster version. Of course, these are all just estimates. How many calories you will burn depends on many factors, including your gender, body weight and genetics. Calorie burn is also largely a result of how hard you work. If you put in a lot of effort, you'll burn a lot of

calories. So try a round one of the above and you might forget you're even working out.


